The Era of Closed Adoption







The Impact of Closed Adoption

- Grief over the loss of a relationship with birth parents and birth family.
- Grief over disconnection from culture and heritage.
- Loss of access to important medical information and family history.
- Self-esteem and identity development issues.







The Era of Open Adoption







High Integrity Open Adoption

- Ongoing contact is not seen as a concession, but is viewed as beneficial to everyone involved – especially the child.
- The parties value one another's unique role in the child's life.
- The child feels unconditional acceptance of their full identity and has access to the constellation of people that love them.













Benefits of Open Adoption

For the Child

- Healthier sense of identity and self-esteem.
- Direct access to information and support from birth family.
- Talking about adoption is welcome.





Benefits of Open Adoption

For Birth Parents

- Agency in the adoption planning process and their child's future.
- Able to express their love for their child.
- •Birth parents see firsthand how their child is doing.
- •They feel honored and validated as birth parent.
- Able to integrate the role of birth parent into their identity and their life.








Benefits of Open Adoption

For Adoptive Parents

- Adoptive parents are chosen by birthparents – empowered, honored.
- Access to answers to their child's questions.
- •Better equipped to help their child develop a healthy sense of identity.
- Know their child more fully.







Trauma is Present in Adoption

- Trauma and loss are a part of adoption.
- This includes cultural trauma.
- How to bring a trauma-informed lens to adoption.



Best Practices in Open Adoption

- Unbiased all-options pregnancy counseling.
- Envisioning the open adoption relationship.
- Choosing an adoptive family.
- Support in building the open adoption relationship.
- Involvement of both birth parents.
- Ongoing post-adoption services.
- Listening to those with lived experience.







Unbiased All-Options Pregnancy Counseling

- Establish neutral and nonjudgmental environment.
- Avoid assumptions about what options are being considered.
- Provide accurate information.
- Connect client with resources and referrals.
- Assess client support systems.
- Explore grief and loss.







Engaging Expectant Fathers

- Fathers are equally valued.
- Create a welcoming, supportive non-judgmental space.

When the choice is adoption:

- They are empowered to explore their role in the adoption planning process.
- There's space to create their own distinct open adoption relationship.








Envisioning the Open Adoption Relationship

Expectant parents' vision is honored:

- Desired qualities in the open adoption relationship.
- Amount of contact.
- Specific desires for hospital time and adoption planning, such as breastfeeding, who comes to pre-natal appointments, etc.







Choosing an Adoptive Family

- Ideally, expectant parents choose a family from a diverse pool of prospective adoptive parents.
- Adoptive parents must have:
 - A current, approved homestudy.
 - 10 hours of pre-adoption training.
- Adoptive parents' readiness for adoption is informed by values, approach and education provided by the agency.

Building an Open Adoption Relationship

- How to honor and respect each other.
- How to include each other in one another's lives and traditions.
- Involvement of extended birth family members.
- Details of what the hospital time will look like.
- Frequency of visits and communication.







Placement and Entrustment

- It's natural for birth parents to revisit their decision after the baby is born.
- Until placement occurs, birth parents can choose to stop adoption planning Same for adoptive parents.
- Birthparents determine timing of consents.
- Placement can be accompanied by an Entrustment. A shared time symbolic of the respect, bond and commitment felt by all as they hold this child at the center.







Creating an Adoption Plan After Birth

- •Trauma-informed model.
- Provide options counseling and address legal questions.
- Choosing and meeting adoptive family.
- Creating and implementing vision for adoption plan and placement.
- •Ongoing counseling, relationship guidance and emotional support provided.







When Clients Face Significant Barriers to Parenting

- Private adoption agencies are in community partnership with ODHS.
- ODHS recognizes not all parents facing state intervention choose to pursue parenthood.
- They support parents' choice to explore private agency adoption.
- The Coalition of Oregon Adoption Agencies created a handout for ODHS to share information about this process.



HOW TO MAKE A PRIVATE ADOPTION PLAN FOR YOUR CHILD IN OREGON

If the choice to parent doesn't feel right for you at this point you have another option – to plan a private agency adoption. Following is information to help you explore this path.

Reasons You May Want to Explore a Private Agency Adoption.

- You may not feel ready to parent at this time in your life.
- You may feel unable to complete the reunification requirements.
- You may already have a child who was adopted through the state and this time you want to create your own open adoption.
- You may want to choose a path for your child that avoids foster care and state involvement.

When Considering a Private Agency Adoption ...

- You can contact a licensed private agency in Oregon that specializes in infant adoptions and has a
 pool of prepared and approved families for you to choose from.
- Look for an agency whose approach, services and values are a good match for you.

In a Private Agency Adoption ...

- · You are empowered to create an adoption plan that feels right to you.
- You select and meet the adoptive family.





Post-Adoption Services

- Access to ongoing no-cost support from a counselor that specializes in open adoption.
- Opportunity to build a community of support with other people involved in adoption constellations.
- Continued opportunities for growth and learning.







The Future of Adoption

- Adopted people have the right to information about their adoption.
- There's support for services and programs that break down barriers to parenting.
- Advocacy for reproductive justice and access to abortion is critical.
- We must actively work to undo systems of oppression – including racism – that have played a role in the field of adoption and child welfare.
