


Polly & Jacob









We're Polly and Jacob! Here is our story...
































#### I'm Jacob

We are looking forward to forming new traditions with our child and their birth family, that will be special and unique for all of us.

We are excited to teach our child new things, and also to be taught new things by them.








# Open adoption aspirations

We know that open adoption can take many forms. We will foster an environment of openness, where our child knows that they can always express themselves with us, without fear. However ours ends up looking, we want our child to feel comfortable asking us hard questions, and feeling their emotions as they come.

We are hopeful that our child will be able have meaningful connections to their birth family, and see pieces of themselves reflected there. Both of us have experience with building families that transcend biology. We know that as adoptive parents we will be forever connected to our child's first family, and we hope that their birth family will always feel welcomed and included as family.

At age 12, Polly witnessed the international adoption of a cousin. It was a profound experience that led her to want to pursue parenting through adoption. When we talked about how to build our family, Jacob was excited about the prospect of growing our family through adoption. In addition to the joy that Polly's family experienced welcoming the new baby, and the thriving, loving environment she has grown up in, the nature of the international adoption meant that she has little access to information about her origins. This is what initially led us to choose the path of open adoption, so that, where possible, we can help provide our child with the puzzle pieces that help make them who they are. The more we have learned about open adoption, the more we see it as the right path for us and our future child.

We promise that regardless of what our specific adoption constellation looks like, it will be founded on deep respect and open-mindedness, and space for us all in our child's life.
